

Yes I really do believe that there is a huge influx of amazing music and art happening now. Together it will change everything. It is a continuation, a new level and Grace Gravity is a part of that ...

When did you get started in music?

I started playing guitar when I was 10. I had this old guitar. My grampa played guitar, although I don't remember us ever playing together. Eventually my guitar was pawned to buy food and other things... we needed the money. I had written a few songs by then, I remember one of them about something that happened in 1973 where I wrote that a "rock had been put in front of my 3rd eye." From my perspective, I woke up one day to feel that something was missing. I didn't really figure out what it was until my early 20s when I realized that I had no instincts or access to my instincts. Something was blocked. I recalled that time when I was 10. I started intending to regain my "instincts", and started mediating. It was a very interesting process of waking up to a bigger reality. Regaining myself, my instincts, a greater overview. It has not left me since.

Music is me. It's not something I do. I am not apart from it. It's who I am. Being a songwriter can be a fun, weird line of "work" but somebody's got to do it. Right?

Tell us about the CD.

I started working out the songs 3 years ago. It's been a long process. Sometimes it literally felt like I was waiting for a certain space/time juncture to get the song down. The songs kind of cover the process of watching the status quo tumble all around and the seemingly never ending re-invention of myself and the music in order to stay awake, stay

alive, stay in love.

Each of us is unique. I think when someone goes fully into themselves and creates art or music, writing, whatever, it's always interesting. Learning about someone else's story often reflects back into your own. I think discovering what our own "story" is, is probably one of the most important things you can do. Some of the songs are about that.

These songs are outside a formula set down by the robotical repetitive constructs that come out of trying to sound like someone else. It's about the feeling and what is transmitted via the feeling. I'm just translating it through, and with the help of some amazing musicians, the Angels, God and the Great Spirit, it comes out being something. It's just me testifying, reporting in.

This CD is recorded in 432 hz not the standard 440 hz? Why?

Yes, 432 hz is more attuned to the natural frequency of the planet. You can feel the difference if you play a chord with your strings tuned to 432 hz vs 440 hz, there is a definite difference in how it feels. Check it out for yourself. It has been shown in Cymatic tests, where they vibrate sound on a metal plate, that the notes that were tuned to 432 hz had a cohesion in their shape, while the notes tuned at 440 hz had shapes that were broken and distorted. It's all very interesting. Feel it and see for yourself. All the songs but one are recorded at 432 hz tuning.

These are not ordinary times we find ourselves in after all. There is no time to waste for each of us to get our creations out into the world. To share who we are. Step up into the Sun ...

Brian D. Hardin was the producer on this CD. He also played drums and other instruments. He really made it easy and fun. He is very creative and is like a mad creative scientist when it comes to mixing. His hands just start moving around and great sounds come out!
